Year 5 and 6 remained at the International sports stadium, but used a revised activity list and competed as a class against the others in their year group. Feedback was then collected from teachers across the school and evaluated in preparation for 2023. | | | setting. PE will be used as a reward for maintaining concentration and will only be accessible to the pupil if the class teacher is happy with their behaviour across the previous week. Improvements in behaviour will be monitored and the result determined by the class teacher. Impact will also be guided by attendance within the session each week (attendance indicating good behaviour)". Once identified for this group, students were monitored during their class lessons. Each week, the class teacher was asked if their behaviour / concentration warranted being able to come out of lessons and partake in a PE related activity. Students were only allowed to take part if their behaviour / concentration deserved it. PE was, for these students, identified as a mechanism to entice the desired behaviour. The scheme works as evidenced by the answers provided by class teachers. | | Improvements in behaviour have been recorded through discussions with teachers, pupils and parents. |

They were able to take part for one session per week with a specialist PE teacher. Please see below an overview of the intention for this group: "This group will focus on pupil premium students and looking to provide achievement and progress. It will look at tasks for them to complete and generate a sense of achievement using a PE based setting. The idea that this boost will then be transferable across the curriculum and within their academic life". | | | of activities that focused on team work and problem solving. PE was, for these students, identified as a mechanism to provide a confidence boost that can then be built upon when back in a classroom setting and throughout the remainder of the working week. | | |
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| PE interventions – sports leaders | Key indicator 1 Key indicator 2 | This intervention looked at selecting student's believed to be possible sports leader candidates – responsible to then lead fun and engaging PE related activities to their peers during a break time or lunch time setting. They were able to take part for one session per week with a specialist PE teacher guiding them through this process to emerge as Putnoe's Sports Leaders for the next academic year. This group focused on year 5 students with the vision to them lead while in year 6. Please see below an overview of the intention for this group: "This group is designed to generate pupils that are happy to take on a leading role within a PE setting. The expectation is that they will complete Putnoe's inhouse training, and then from this have the confidence and skills that will allow them to take ownership and deliver PE related activities to their peers and wider school during lunch times. This in turn will help provide targeted and organised PE on a regular basis with a participation focus. The selected students will provide a supporting role to the current Sports Leaders (yr. 6 students) ready to then assume the role when they enter year 6". Students completed a programme of worked, designed to teach and develop leadership qualities, as well as a confidence to lead PE activities in front of small groups. | Across academic year 2021 / 2022 | The Sports Leaders are trained for next year (this was due to restrictions and mixing) Newly trained Sports Leaders will begin in October 2022 and will be involved in a timetable with KS1 pupils. |

| PE interventions – progress group | Key indicator 1 Key indicator 2 | This intervention looked at improving the ability level of selected students, especially those that would benefit from spending a little more directed time on the fundamental skills required in PE. They were able to take part for one session per week with a specialist PE teacher. Please see below an overview of the intention for this group: "This group will focus on and act as a booster group for those children who have not moved on the PE tracking sheet. It will be for students who are either struggling with fundamental skills or who are noticeably behind the general trend of the class in terms of attainment level. Levels may still be lower due to the impact COVID-19 has had on PE and school in general, this group is not for those students. This is for students that struggle with the simple activities in PE and cannot complete the tasks that the teacher is setting within PE lessons. As a result, their attainment in PE will rise and therefore have an impact or confidence in other areas of the curriculum". By working in a smaller group, students were able to get directed help in developing said skills, allowing them to become more competent when completing the PE activities in their normal class lessons. PE was, for these students, a way to build on their current skill set, which then can be applied directly to specific sports. | Across academic year 2021 / 2022 | Questionnaire responses from teachers and pupils.
