




Hungry Caterpillar/Bog Baby/Jack & the Beanstalk. Possible Learning Experiences:



Literacy: Reading Revising phase 3 digraphs

Oral Segmenting - This is when you split a word into its individual sounds (c-a-t). We can call this robot talk.



Scan to hear phase 3 phonemes

Oral Blending - This is when you blend the sounds together to say the word (cat). We can use a blending arm motion from left to right to

help blend the sounds together.



Using our phonic knowledge and blending and segmenting skills to read longer words and a few common exception words (non phonetic)

Digraph: two letters that make one phoneme


Trigraph: three letters that make one phoneme

Literacy: Writing Using phonic knowledge to orally compose and write a sentence/sentences independently.

Physical Development: Gross and Fine Motor Skills

- Funky Fingers threading, cutting, using tweezers, tearing and scrunching paper
- Using the 'three friends hold (holding a pencil correctly)

P.E. Focus on ball skills. rolling, kicking and throwing a ball, aiming at a target, using a racquet/bat, taking part in team games (tennis and rounders)

Children will know and talk about the different factors that support their overall health and wellbeing: regular physical activity, healthy eating, tooth brushing, sensible amounts of screen time, having a good sleep routine and being a safe pedestrian.

Maths: comparing lengths and height, measuring capacity, addition and subtraction, 3D shapes and

numbers to 20 and beyond

Addition and Subtraction:

Children will build on using concrete (objects) and pictorial methods (drawing dots) to add and subtract quantities.to 10 by using Numicon to solve calculations.

We will be naming and describing 3D shapes and selecting, rotating and manipulating shapes to develop spatial reasoning skills.
