English


# Writing

Children will continue to focus on both fiction and non-fiction units of work. To complement their Science topic, they will create an explanation of the water cycle using key features such as subheadings, chronological order and specific key vocabulary. The pupils will create a suspenseful characterisation of a familiar character from 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. They will use their knowledge of the 'Fantastics' to create thrilling action sentences and use their senses to conjure up a picture of that moment in time.

#### Maths

This term, the children will be focusing on 3 areas. The first focus is on decimals. Pupils will look at the decimal place value chart and learn the fraction equivalents; as well as comparing, rounding and ordering decimals. The second focus will be on money; they will convert between pounds and pence, estimate, compare amounts of money and solve problems involving money. Lastly, they will revisit

years, months, days and weeks; convert between analogue and digital times; and convert to and from the 24 hour clock.

#### Science

Pupils will learn about electricity. They will name and locate battery and mains operated appliances and construct simple circuits They will use their enquiry approaches to observe and compare how different components work in a circuit and whether a circuit will work. Pupils will look how Benjamin Franklin contributed towards the development and understanding of electricity, **Computing** 

## Physical Education

This half term, the pupils will be focusing on athletics during their outdoor PE lessons. They will focus on different skills such as sprinting, jumping, target throwing and vortex throw. The pupils will look at how to compete and the importance of teamwork when completing events such as a relay.

### PSHE

Our theme this term is 'Living in the Wider World'; pupils will explore money and work. They will do this by understanding the role of having a job. Similarly, they will learn the difference between incomes and expenses as well as developing more knowledge about budgets, where they will create their own budget. They will also be learning and about the importance of sustaining good physical health, looking closely at maintaining a balanced lifestyle, oral hygiene and dental care.




Personal Development

Children will make a wire sculpture inspired by the artist George Seural and his piece 'The Circus'. After exploring how to draw a ringmaster, they will use the work by Alex Calder's 'Cirque Calder' to inspire them to create a wire sculpture of a circus figure. Children will explore how to use the wire to create their desired shapes.

#### Music

In Music this half term, children will be developing their singing skills. We will look at appropriate phrasing, extending their note range and clarity in diction. We will sing in two parts, using simple harmonies, musical interjections or call and answer sessions.







#### History

This half term, children will explore the life of the Anglo-Saxons. Children will use drama to mimic the movements of Scots invading England and the English struggling to defend Using role play, they will then explore why they came and why they took over parts of Britain after the Romans. Using their researching skills, they will investigate what their life was like, exploring their daily life compared to ours.



Humanities

# Religious Education

The pupils will learn about Hinduism and how faith is expressed in Hindu communities. They will explore areas such Puja and focus on what it is and how it is performed. The children will look at the common symbols, objects and pictures within the faith to gain a better insight in what they look like and how they are used. We welcome any parents who would like to offer to talk, share objects or information regarding Hinduism to contact your class

#### French

Children will learn how to tell the time at: o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. They will learn how to read timetables and TV schedules and answer simple questions about these. The unit is drawn together with a final lesson calculating the difference between two times.
